GUIDE FOR CONTRIBUTORS TO THE JOURNAL OF ECONOMIC STUDIES (JES)

Journal of Economic Studies (JES) (ISSN: 1119-2259) is published by the Department of Economics, Faculty of Social Sciences, Nnamdi Azikiwe University, Awka, Nigeria, and accepts submission of original articles covering a diverse range of topics. These well researched papers must address recent contemporary economic policy issues and should contribute towards filling a knowledge gap.

Manuscript Review Policy

Manuscripts should be submitted as an electronic file in Microsoft Word. It will be helpful to have a separate title page and fully masked. To facilitate masked review, all indication of authorship must be limited to this page (other pages must show the short title plus page number at the top right).

The main document must include the abstract and all tables, figures, and appended materials and must mask unpublished author citations throughout the manuscript.

Author(s) should note that the manuscript (a) should conform to the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association [APA] (6th edition) standards; (b) is not currently under review elsewhere; (c) has not been previously published in whole or in part.

Any manuscript that does not conform to requirements may be returned for reworking or retyping. The publisher reserves the right to copyedit manuscripts to conform to journal style.

The lead author will receive galley proof for correction of typographical errors only. No rewriting of the accepted manuscript will be allowed in the proof stage.

The lead author of each article will receive one free copy of the journal after publication. Additional copies may be purchased at the prevailing price from the Publisher.

It is the responsibility of author(s) to obtain permission to use previously published material in their manuscript.

Manuscript Preparation and Style

The manuscript which will follow the APA standard should not be more than 8000 words - including abstract, quotations, notes, references, figure captions, and tables.

Manuscripts should be typed with 1.5 spacing, 12" font size with Times New Roman on A4 size paper and justified with all pages numbered consecutively.

Main centre headings of important section of the articles like abstract, introduction, methods and procedures, results and discussion and conclusion, should be in title case

The title page (page 1) should include: (a) full article title, (b) names and affiliations of all authors, (c) mailing and email addresses and telephone numbers of the individual serving as the point of contact.
