



EXPLORING THE TIMELESS DEPICTION OF HUMAN FLAWS IN JONATHAN SWIFT’S GULLIVERS’ TRAVELS: A STYLISTIC ANALYSIS

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ABSTRACT

This paper takes a stylistic analysis of Jonathan Swift’s *Gulliver’s Travel*, examining how the author’s use of language contributes to its theme of timeless depiction of the universality of human flaws. The study adopted a content analysis approach where the text was closely read and studied. Though randomly selected, the study examines Swift’s use of irony, satire, hyperbole, symbolism, allusion and repetition as well as various sentence types and grammatical structures to critique human nature. The analysis brings to the fore that Swift’s use of language are not only intentional but also deliberate and serves as an effective resources for highlighting the absurdity and complexity of human nature, rendering *Gulliver’s Travels* a powerful and enduring critique of human flaws. The outcomes of this study demonstrate the significance of the author’s novel as a timeless commentary on human nature, with implications for our understandings of the human condition in contemporary society.

INTRODUCTION

Gulliver's Travels by Jonathan Swift is a timeless satirical piece which has enjoyed some scholarly interpretation for centuries. It is particularly interesting especially as its tone, language, theme and style continually resonate with the contemporary realities of the present world. The text, was written in 1726, exactly, 299 years ago. This timeless classic is a scathing critique of societal norms, politics, and human nature, offering a clear exploring of the universality of evil in humanity. For as, Christopher Lloyd (1939:xvi) observes, "Swift wished to show, as in a mirror, the pettiness of human affairs and to show that man's egotism is due to his failure to see human affairs in their true proportion". It is this position that made Swift himself to say that "man is really an insignificant creature, but he thinks himself the centre of the whole scheme of thing (*Gulliver's Travel*, xvi). Through Lemuel Gulliver's fantastical voyages, Swift masterfully exposes the flaws and follies of humanity, revealing a universal truth that evil is an inherent aspect of human nature, manifesting in various forms and guises across culture and time (Bloom, 2009). This is akin to William Golding's *Lord of the Flies*. Recent stylistic scholarship emphasizes the role of linguistic choices in shaping readers interpretation of literary texts and their underlying Ideological meanings (Jeffries & McIntyre, 2018).

The theme of evil as portrayed in *Gulliver's Travels* is a complex one, encompassing issues of moral depravity, corruption, and destructiveness (Arendt, 1963). Thus, Swift's use of satire, irony and symbolism serves to highlight the pervasive nature of evil, demonstrating how it can manifest in even the most seemingly civilized societies (Quint, 1988). Therefore, Swift language and style is not only timeless but also a clear demonstration of his mastery. In commenting about Swift style, Lloyd (1939:xv-xvi)

...partly the extraordinary vivid and concrete picture Swift draws; partly the beautiful lucidity of his style: the style is clear, masculine, and smooth, but not florid: for they avoid nothing more than multiplying unnecessary words; or using various expressions. It is a good definition of Swift's own style, which enables him to tell a story clearly with exactly the right amount of detail.

Commenting on Style, Crystal (2010) says it is the choices a writer makes about language, tone, and format to convey their message effectively. Akpan (2025) adds that style encompasses elements like vocabulary, syntax, punctuation, and tone, which contribute to the overall clarity, coherence and impact of the text.

On the other hand, language plays a significant role in shaping stylistic choices, as it influences the choices writers make about tone, vocabulary, syntax, and other linguistic features. According to Leech and Short (1981), language is the primary means by which stylistic choices are realized, and it shapes the writer's attitude, perspective, and it

shapes the writers attitude, perspective, and relationship with the reader. Therefore, no doubt, language makes man unique in his communication because it enables him to capture his social complexities in their various unique forms and manners of occurrence. This makes Otagburuaga (1999), believes that all normal human beings communicate through this mode. An important point to note about the use of language in communication is that every language satisfies the communicative needs of the users. This is true as human beings really capture their experiences in their communication with others.

Despite being written over two centuries ago, Jonathan Swift's *Gulliver's Travels* remains a powerful commentary on human nature, satirizing the flaws and follies of humanity that are still prevalent today. This study examine the stylistic devices and thematic concerns employed by Swift to depict human flaws, and argues that the novel's timeless portrayal of human nature makes it a work of enduring relevance and importance in contemporary society.

About Jonathan Swift and *Gulliver Travels*

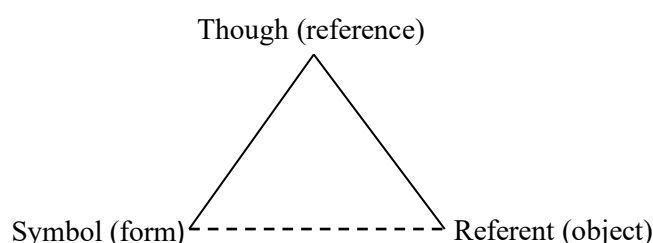
Jonathan Swift was an Anglo-Irish writer, poet, and satirist. He lived between 1667-1745. He was born in Dublin, Ireland, Swift was educated at trinity College Dublin, and later moved to England, where he became involved in political and literature. He was a prominent figure in London literary circles and was known for his witty and insightful writings on politics, society and literature.

Some of Swift's works include: *A Tale of a Tub* (1704), *The Battle of Books* (1704), *A Meditation Upon a Broomstick* (1710), *The Examiner* (1710), *The Conduct of Allies* (1711), *A Modest Proposal* (1729), *Gulliver Travels* (1726), *The Draplier's Letters* (1725), and *A Complete Collection of Gental and Ligneous Conversation* (1738), among many others. Swift's writings often employed satire, irony and ridicule to critique societal norms, politics, and human nature. The book under study – *Gulliver's Travels*, is a classic example of satire, using fantasy and absurdity to comment on the politics, culture, and values of his time (Winker, 2005).

Gulliver's Travel (1726) is a satirical novel that tells the story of Lemuel Gulliver, a ship's surgeon who embarks on four fantastical voyages to remote Island. The novel is divided into four books, each describing a different journey: Lilliput, Brobdingnang, Laputa and Balnibarbi and Houghnhnms and Yahoos. Through Gulliver's adventures Swift critiques the politics, culture and values of his time, using satire to comment on issues like colonialism, nationalism, and the abuse of power. The novel's enduring popularity lies in its timeless themes and its ability to entertain, educate, and challenge readers to reflect on their own society and humanity.

The Concept of Stylistics

According to Leech and Short (1981), Stylistics is the study of language used in literary works, focusing on the ways in which authors employ linguistic features to convey meaning, create effects, and evoke emotions. For Fish (1986), style is the peculiarity and uniqueness elements of a text, such as syntax, vocabulary, imagery and tone, to understand how they contribute to the overall meaning and impact of the work. By meaning, it refers to the interpretation or understanding a text's significance, message, or theme. By this we mean the underlying idea, concepts, or idea that the author conveys through the narrative, characters, language, and other literary elements. This affirms Ogden and Richards (1949) semantic or semiotic triangle, where they opined that meaning arises from a relationship among three things: the object (or referent), the person (or interpreter), and the sign.



Explaining this diagram, Okeke (2010) explicates that words refer to things they name rather than signify and that the word is a composite of form and concept while, symbol is the word, sentence or form; referent or object in the object in the world of experience and thought or reference is the concept. This dotted lines imply that there is no direct link between the symbol and referent but only through the mediation of thought or reference. However, burke (2017) argues that modern stylistic analysis provides valuable tools for examining the relationship between textual patterns and literary meaning.

In all of this, meaning is still an abstract, vague and a slippery concept. It is not fixed or static. It is in our estimation subjective and can vary depending on the reader's interpretation, cultural context, and historical period. Readers bring their own experiences, biases, and perspectives to the text, influencing their understanding of the meaning.

Stylistics draws on various linguistic theories and approaches, including foregrounding, deviation, register, and cognitive. To stockwell (2020), cognitive stylistic approaches suggest that literary texts engage readers by activating, mental frameworks through language and narrative structure. Stylisticians examine how language is used to create meaning, how it deviates from norms, and how readers process and interpret literary texts. By combining these approaches, the stylistics analyst can provide a

comprehensive analysis of the literary work, shedding light on the complex interplay between language, meaning and context. In this study, we will examine the language employed by Swift in *Gulliver's Travels* to uncover the underlying patterns and structures that shape the narrative, revealing the author's craft and artistry. This will help us gain a deeper understanding of the text, appreciate the writer's craft, and develop a more objective interpretation of the text. Contemporary studies in stylistic continue to demonstrate how language functions as a vehicle for social representation of social realities, attitudes, and human behavior (Simpson, 2019).

Theoretical Domain

This study will anchor on a mix of theories to enable it properly situate the study. It will draw on Ferdinand de Saussure theory of structuralism which sees language as a system of signs, the signifier and signified, and the important structure and relations in understanding meaning. Also, the study uses the satire theory, a theory that has evolved over time, with various writers contributing to its development. Its main concern is using humour, irony, and ridicule to critique society and politics. It will also draw from postcolonial theory which is concerned with the ways in which colonialism and imperialism have shaped the world we lived in, particularly in terms of power dynamics, cultural identity and social justice. Halliday's Systemic Functional Grammar (SFG) will be deployed in analyzing sentences from the text (Halliday, 1978). Contemporary discussions of structuralism continue to recognize its importance in understanding how meaning is produced through underlying systems of language and representation (Culler, 2023). Even Dong et al., (2025) collaborate this position that structuralist approaches remain relevant for examining patterns, relationships, and symbolic structures within literary texts. In addition to the above, Onah (2024) in commenting on postcolonial theory emphasizes the need to foreground marginalized histories, indigenous epistemologies and alternative forms of cultural memory in literary studies. Finally on systemic functional grammar, Doran, Martin & Herrington (2024) maintain that SFG have further expanded the study of context meaning making, and discourse organization in textual analysis.

By the employment of simple, compound, and complex sentence, the writer creates a sense of wonder, satire, and social commentary, drawing the reader into the “utopian” worlds of Lilliput, Brobdingnang, and beyond. In this study, attempt would be made to explore how the author’s sentence structures contribute to the overall meaning and tone of the novel. Here are some specific examples.

From the above, Swift use of sentences are suiting for his theme. For instance, the author employs a range of sentence structures to create a sense of wonders, satire, and social commentary. Simple sentences are used to pass on straight forward information; compound sentences are used to connect related ideas, and complex sentences are deployed to show relationship between ideas, while compound – complex sentences are used to create intricate and nuanced arguments. Primarily, the author’s use of these sentences contribute to the clarity, elegance, and persuasive power of his writing.

Swift's use of Grammatical Structures

Swift use of grammatical structures in *Gulliver's Travels* contributes significantly to his literary style, tone, and theme. Here are some features of the author's use of grammatical structures.

CONCLUSION

From the discussion, we can conclude that swift's use of language in *Gulliver's Travels* is suiting and intentional. This was to allow him the leverage to reflectively criticize human flaws through, the author's effective deployment of devices like irony, exaggeration, symbolism, satire and metaphor he has been able to highlight the absurdity and complexity of human native, revealing the flaw and follies of humanity

Additionally, our analysis of the use of sentence structure reveals an intentional use of technique such as hypotaxis, and operational use techniques such as hypotaxis, and parataxis to create complexity in the portrayal of human native. Thus, this study reveals that swift use of language is a key factor in the novel's enduring relevance and impact. By using language in a way that is both playful and incisive, the author creates a critique of human nature that is both humorous and defrosting which is timeless and relevant to contemporary society.

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
